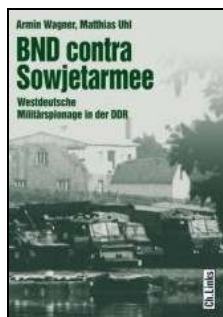

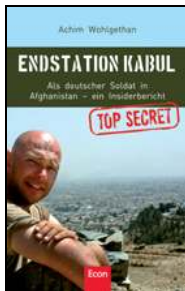
Dieses Buch untersucht die Ausspähung der sowjetischen Truppen in Ostdeutschland durch die Organisation Gehlen und den Bundesnachrichtendienst vom Ende der vierziger Jahre bis zum Fall der Mauer. Anhand von erstmals freigegebenen Akten des BND und Dokumenten der Spionageabwehr des MfS beschreiben die Autoren Strukturen, Methoden und Alltag

westdeutscher Geheimdienstaktionen an der Frontlinie des Kalten Krieges. Dies ist nicht die Geschichte großer Meisterspione und Agentenjäger, sondern tausender Geschäftsreisender, Kraftfahrer, Studenten, Hausfrauen und Rentner, die im Laufe von vierzig Jahren in Pullachs Diensten spionierten und nicht selten ihren Agenteneinsatz mit langjähriger Haft oder dem Leben bezahlten. Am Beispiel nachrichtendienstlicher Angriffe gegen die Gruppe Sowjetischer Streitkräfte in Deutschland zeigt die Konfrontation zwischen BND und MfS die verflochtene Beziehung beider deutscher Staaten im Schnittpunkt von Geheimdienst-, Militär- und politischer Geschichte.(a-f)

Bookhint: IAEA calls claim that Canadian was recruited by Russian spy baseless



The United Nations nuclear agency dismissed allegations Monday by a former Russian Intelligence service agent who claims in a recently published book that he manipulated the UN's Iraqi oil-for-food program by, among other things, recruiting a Canadian nuclear expert.

"The allegations are baseless," a spokesman for the Vienna-based International Atomic Energy Agency told The Canadian Press by telephone.

Sergei Tretyakov, a former deputy head of intelligence at Russia's UN mission, defected to the United States with his family in 2000. An account of his experiences in the book "Comrade J.: The Untold Secrets of Russia's Master Spy in America after the End of the Cold War," was published in the United States last week. In it, Tretyakov claims he oversaw an operation that helped Saddam Hussein's regime manipulate the price of Iraqi oil sold under a UN humanitarian program, and allowed Russia to skim profits.

He told The Associated Press that among the spies he recruited for Russia while at the UN were a Canadian nuclear weapons expert, a senior Russian official in the oil-for-food program and a former Soviet bloc ambassador.

Beirut car bomb kills police intelligence officer



A car bomb killed a police intelligence officer involved in the investigation of assassinations in Lebanon, in an attack in a Christian suburb of Beirut on Friday. Police chief Brigadier-General Ashraf Rifi named the officer targeted in the blast while on his way to work as Captain **Wisam Eid**. A bodyguard and two other people were also killed.

Eid, 31, worked for an intelligence unit widely viewed as close to anti-Syrian ruling coalition leader Saad al-Hariri and which was frequently criticised by the Syrian-backed opposition. "Eid had a role in all the files linked to terrorist bombings," Rifi told reporters at the scene. Lebanese minister Ahmad Fatfat said: "The Captain was no ordinary officer. He was a specialist in communications, which is a very important field. He played a central role in analyzing the phone calls in a large number of attacks, starting with the assassination of **Rafik Hariri**."

The ruling majority says Syria is behind Hariri's slaying and many of the more than 30 bombings that have hit Lebanon in the past three years, often targeting anti-Syrian figures. Damascus has denied involvement in any of the killings.

Eid's killing comes at a time of a deepening political crisis in which the Western-backed ruling coalition and Hezbollah-led opposition have been at odds for over a year.

The crisis has paralysed government and its institutions and has left Lebanon with no head of state for the first time since the 1975-1990 civil war. (a-e)

Pakistan Rejects U.S. Intelligence Presence

Pakistani military and intelligence leaders met secretly with the top two U.S. intelligence officials in Islamabad earlier this month. During that meeting, Director of National Intelligence Michael McConnell and CIA Director Gen. Michael Hayden pressed Pakistan for greater access to the country for U.S. intelligence assets and offered Pakistan help in its battle with Taliban remnants and al-Qaeda in its Northwest Frontier Provinces. The meeting came in the aftermath of the assassination of former Pakistani Prime Minister Benazir Bhutto, when it appeared that the country might be descending into chaos.

Sources familiar with the meeting are now revealing, however, that despite the increasing restlessness in Pakistan at the time, **President Pervez Musharraf denied greater influence** to U.S. intelligence officials inside his country. (a,b)

US Congress: Long-Range Ballistic Missile Defense in Europe

Successive administrations have urged the creation of an anti-missile system to protect against long-range ballistic missile threats from rogue states. The Bush Administration believes that North Korea and Iran are strategic threats and questions whether they can be deterred by conventional means. The Administration's policy position on this issue remains unchanged after a recent reassessment that the Iranian nuclear weapons program was halted in 2003. The Administration has built longrange missile defense bases in Alaska and California to protect against North Korean missile threats. Although the system has been tested, most agree that further testing is necessary. The Administration proposed deploying a ground-based mid-course defense (GMD) element of the larger Ballistic Missile Defense System (BMDS) in Europe to defend against an Iranian missile threat. The system would include 10 interceptors in Poland and a radar in the Czech Republic to be completed by 2013 at a cost of \$4.04 billion.

Blackwater has filed a \$30 million malpractice suit against the high-powered team of lawyers the firm hired to defend against a wrongful death lawsuit filed by the families of the Fallujah Four. The complaint accused the lawyers at Wiley Rein -- including current White House counsel Fred Fielding and Margaret Ryan, now a U.S. Court of Appeals judge for the Armed Forces, both then in private practice -- of "sloppy pleading" that prevented Blackwater from properly defending itself.

How the CIA Infiltrated the DEA

The DEA and its predecessor federal drug law enforcement organizations have always been infiltrated and, to varying degrees, managed by America's intelligence agencies. The reason is simple enough: the US Government has been protecting its drug smuggling allies, especially in organized crime, since trafficking was first criminalized in 1914. Since then drug law enforcement has been a function of national security in its broadest sense; not just protecting US aristocracy from foreign enemies, but preserving the Establishment's racial, religious and class prerogatives. The glitch in the system is that while investigating traffickers, federal drug agents are always unearthing the Establishment's ties to organized crime and its proxy drug syndicates. US intelligence and security agencies recognized this problem early in the early 1920s and to protect their Establishment patrons (and foreign and domestic drug smuggling allies fighting communists), they dealt with the problem by suborning well-placed drug law enforcement managers and agents.

MI6 Urged UK to Drop Saudi Inquiry

Britain's head of overseas intelligence warned that Saudi Arabia likely would stop sharing vital information on terrorism if prosecutors pursued an investigation into alleged corruption in an arms deal, lawmakers disclosed Tuesday.

Ministers were told the inquiry into the BAE Systems PLC arms deal with Saudi Arabia could lead to a withdrawal of Saudi assistance on counterterrorism, according to the annual report of the Intelligence and Security committee. The committee scrutinizes the work of Britain's intelligence and security agencies.

Britain's Serious Fraud Office in December 2006 ended the inquiry into allegations that BAE Systems ran a \$118.9 million "slush fund" offering sweeteners to Saudi Arabian officials in return for lucrative arms contracts. (a,b)

Die Privatisierung des Kriegs und der Spionage

Von der Öffentlichkeit wenig beachtet ist in den vergangenen eineinhalb Jahrzehnten ein Prozess in Gang gekommen, dessen Ende noch lange nicht absehbar ist: die Privatisierung von Sicherheitsaufgaben, die früher fast ausschließlich vom Staat wahrgenommen worden waren. Söldner hat es zwar immer schon gegeben, doch heutige private Militärfirmen weisen jegliche Vergleiche mit dem Söldnerwesen von einst weit von sich. Private Sicherheitsdienstleister sind schon seit längerem aktiv, während private Nachrichtendienste noch ein ziemlich junges Phänomen sind.

Die **Akademie für Politik und Zeitgeschichte** der bayerischen **Hanns-Seidel-Stiftung** versuchte bei einer mehrtägigen Fachtagung in Wildbad Kreuth das Phänomen der privaten Militär- und Sicherheitsdienstleister zu beleuchten. Dabei wurde klar: In den USA und in Großbritannien sind private Militärfirmen ebenso wie private Sicherheits- und Nachrichtendienste längst akzeptierter Teil des Sicherheitssektors, während man sich in kontinentaleuropäischen Ländern mit privatisierter Sicherheit erst anzufreunden beginnt.

The East Berlin Tunnel: Whose Ruse?

On a rainy day 52 years ago, the cover was blown on one of the biggest espionage plots of the Cold War. Soviet and East German forces announced that they had found a quarter-mile-long tunnel that the CIA had burrowed into East Berlin as part of a massive wiretapping operation. Aided by British intelligence, the tunnelers tapped into three large cables that carried most of the telephone and telegraph traffic between East Berlin and points farther afield, including Moscow. For nearly a year, U.S. and British spies recorded the communists' communications, amassing more than 25 tons of magnetic tape that were culled for clues by hundreds of translators and processors in Washington and London.

More than a half-century later, however, scholars and spies are still arguing over which side really succeeded in pulling the wool over the other's eyes. The debate, revived in part by the recent release of the CIA's internal history of the operation, underscores how public perceptions are often more important in espionage than the value of stolen secrets.

"It was all part of the bigger game between the Americans and the Soviets during the Cold War," said Bernd Stoeber, a **historian** at the University of Potsdam who studies the conflict. "Spying was something like a contest, in which they showed each other who was better at playing the game. They were happy to show the public that they were professionals in this secret spy war, in which normally they can't talk about anything." (a-d)
